Warming Up

1. Describe a time when you repeatedly told someone not to do something, but he or she would not listen to you. How did it feel?

2. Why do you think we sometimes refuse to listen to advice, even if it is wise advice?

Digging In

3. Nebuchadnezzar's defeat of Jerusalem happened in stages. The first stage occurred in 605 B.C., when Nebuchadnezzar brought Daniel and other young men from Jerusalem to Babylon (Daniel 1:1-5). The rest of Jerusalem's residents remained, but they lived in fear of Nebuchadnezzar. A prophet named Jeremiah, who lived in Jerusalem, wrote Jeremiah 25:1-14 during this time. Read those verses now. Why is Jeremiah frustrated (vv. 1-6)?

What will God do as a result (vv. 7-11)?

Some people think that God was too lenient on Jerusalem because He warned them for over 20 years. Others think He was too harsh because of the consequences He eventually gave them for their disobedience. Where do you land? Defend your position in your group.

What does God say He will eventually do to Babylon (vv. 12-14)?

4. Years later, Nebuchadnezzar took more people from Jerusalem to Babylon. Jeremiah wrote a letter to those people, giving them a message from God. Read **Jeremiah 29:1-14**. What does God tell the captured ones to do (vv. 4-7)?

Jesus says that as a Christian, you are away from your home because your home is in heaven (John 17:14-18). How could you apply God's advice above to your life as a Christian?
