### DIGGING DEEPER

1. Another image the Bible uses to represent the community of believers is a vineyard. In the parable that Jesus told in **Matthew 21:33-46**, the landowner represented God, the vineyard represented His community of believers, the farmers/tenants represented the leaders whom God entrusted to care for His people, and the servants represented God's prophets. When the landowner sent his servants to get the fruit from the vineyard, what happened? (vv. 33-39)

What is the result of the tenant's bad behavior? (vv. 40-43)

What was Jesus saying about the importance of church leadership in this parable? How can you be praying for your church leaders?

2. The vineyard imagery in this passage comes from **Isaiah 5:1-7**. Read that passage, and jot down a few things that stick out to you about this passage. If you feel comfortable, share these observations with your group.

Once again, the vineyard is a representation of God's chosen people. What happens when God doesn't find good fruit there?

In this passage, what is the fruit God is looking for? What does this mean practically?
